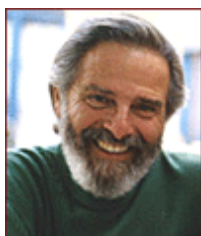

#### What You Will Learn

After attending this seminar, you will be able to:

- Identify sources of funding;
- Maximize the programmatic relevance of your proposal to the targeted agency;
- Appreciate how to write for reviewers and how to make your proposal reviewer friendly;
- Understand the peer-review process and how to avoid problems that are inherent to it;
- Formulate a focusing central hypothesis and/or statement of need for your application;
- Organize and present a sound research plan that accurately reflects the rationale and goals of the proposed research activity;
- Create and justify a budget; and
- Optimize presentation of your research team's credentials, as well as the resources that will support your project.

The program is targeted to junior and mid-career faculty members, postdoctoral research fellows, and senior graduate students. There will be plenty of time for questions and discussion. Each registrant will receive The Grant Application Writer's Workbook, as well as an extensive handout that contains examples and slides from the seminar.
